<b>Day and Date</b>	04-06-25 (Wednesday)
<b>Objectives</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>● Introducing children to the story of Eid al-Adha and its religious significance.</li><li>● Reinforcing moral values such as sacrifice and altruism.</li><li>● Developing children's coloring and artistic expression skills.</li><li>● Enhancing the spirit of Eid celebration.</li></ul>

<b>Participants</b>	Grade 1&2 students
<b>Activity</b>	<p>Students watched a simple and moving visual presentation of the story of Prophet Abraham (peace be upon him) and his command to sacrifice his son Ishmael, and how they responded to God's command with complete obedience and faith.</p> <p>After watching the story and discussing its meanings, students participated in a fun hands-on activity.</p> <p><b>Grade 1:</b> Pre-prepared cards were distributed with drawings and phrases related to Eid al-Adha. Students freely and creatively colored these cards.</p> <p><b>Grade 2:</b> Students created cards on the theme. They showcased diverse Eid-themed designs, featuring festive symbols, greetings, vibrant colors, and a mix of simple and intricate styles.</p>
